

\$ 5,819,767 was spent on staff and consumer wages and benefits!

The agency employed 169 staff members at the close of the fiscal year. 101 were full-time. 68 were part-time.

Over 100 day program consumers earned wages from their work training.

\$ 168,384 was spent on food and household supplies.

\$ 44,257 was spent on gasoline.

\$ 179,433 was spent on other local goods and services.

\$ 155,098 was spent on vehicle maintenance and insurance.

The agency was established in 1969 by a group of area parents who wanted to provide their school-aged and adult children with specialized training and recreational options. Parents and families continue to be an integral part of our team and planning process.

In Fiscal Year 2016, CCAR Industries served *445* individuals in the central Illinois area with the majority of the individuals served residing in Coles County.

Once again, the agency's program consumers, parents, and other stakeholders reported a high level of satisfaction in regard to their services. *99%* of the individuals surveyed at the close of the fiscal year expressed satisfaction in all areas.

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Early Intervention

This program provides comprehensive child development services to eligible infants and toddlers until their third birthday. The therapy emphasizes the basic skills necessary for entering other educational environments. In addition, the therapists work with parents, caregivers, and other professionals to create a positive learning environment through play.

Client & Family Support

This program provides services to individuals enrolled in the Respite program, Home Based Support program for Adults and Children, and Family CILA and Intermittent CILA programs. All services are designed to assist the individual to maintain or attain community living.

Developmental Training, Recycling, & Adult Day Services

The Senior Program and Adult Day Services (ages 55 and up) provides leisure activities in a relaxed atmosphere with a focus on social interaction, community integration and maintaining physical skills. This site also provides adult day services for senior citizens though the Department on Aging.

The Lincoln Avenue Center (ages 18 and up) provides work skill training while emphasizing the social and functional skills necessary to be successful in the workplace and community.

The Locust Street Center (ages 18 and up) uses a Total Communication approach and provides sensory activities. The program uses the "Creating a Meaningful Day" curriculum. The program is also geared towards building upon and maintaining individual adult daily living skills.

The **Recycling Program (ages 18 and up)** provides work training opportunities to individuals who are enrolled in the Developmental Training program. They recycle cardboard, other paper products, and shred confidential documents. Each week, consumers pick-up materials from Mattoon and Charleston businesses. Recycling materials are accepted on Monday - Friday from 9:00 am until 2:00 pm at 1600 Lincoln Avenue. In Fiscal Year 2016, the *program recycled 1,186,001 lbs of material!*

Residential Services

The agency owns eleven **Community Integrated Living Arrangement (CILA)** homes in Charleston that provide 24-hour supervision to adults with intellectual disabilities. The residents work on personal goals for independent living and community integration.

The **Children's Group Home** in Charleston provides 24-hour residential services to children between the ages of 10 up to 22 years old. CCAR staff work closely with the local schools to provide continuity between residential and educational services.

Vocational Services

Vocational Services (Manufacturing & Supported Employment) (ages 18 and up) places an emphasis on work training, adult daily living skills, and recreation to assist individuals in being as independent as possible in the community and workplace. Consumers are able to receive paid work training at the plant, in the community, or at agency-owned sites.

Employment Placement assists individuals in finding competitive employment (earning minimum wage or above) in the local community through CCAR's contract with the DHS-Division of Rehabilitation Services (DHS-DRS). Program staff develop partnerships with area businesses who are in need of reliable, long-term employees who are eager to work.
